# Cost of the Cross Week 4 – The Good Shepard

John 10:1-21

"My heart sings of your longing for me, and my thoughts climb down to marvel at your mercy. I do not fear as you gather up my days. Your name is the sweetness of time, and you carry me close into the night, speaking consolations, drawing down lights from the sky, saying, See how the night has no terrors for one who remembers the name."

Do you believe that we truly understand the image that Jesus was using in John 10: 1-5 and again in 7-10?

Do we understand what it means to be His flock?

#### Background

Jesus, faces backlash after healing a young man of his blindness (John 9). The young man is band from the synagogue and Jesus goes and searches for him. And then then young man is asked if he believes in the "Son of man" and he wants to know where he is that he might believe in Him. Jesus says that He is standing in front of him, and the young man comes to belief in Jesus. So Jesus starts to tell the people who he is, and how he differs from these Pharisees. He tells then that He is the one and only true and honest Shepard who will bring his people from all over into the fold, where there is life and life in abundance.

**John 10:10** – A thief comes to steal and kill and destroy, but I came to give life – life in all its fullness.

Jesus is also using 3 separate but connected concepts to highlight how he differs from the offers leaders. What are the challenges we face in:

- a. Becoming more familiar (continuously engaging) with God?

- c. Trusting Him to follow where He might go?

- In John 10:11-13 and again in 10:14-16 Jesus tries to explain to the people why He has come. Why the Shepherd has come to live with his flock. What hope and understanding does this passage bring for you?

He is doing this to follow the command of his Father. He is willing to freely give everything, all of Himself, for the safety and freedom, for the life of His flock. What does knowing this mean for you?

- What will it take for you to follow Him where He might lead you this week?
